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

Summary of proposed activity, with dates where applicable, indicating clearly if this is intended to be a complete outcome, developmental, collaborative and/or part of a strategy that includes external funding applications or already committed internal funding:

A one-day symposium examining the ethical and moral motives and social philosophy behind illustrators’ and cartoonists’ practice, towards developing a social conscience within a commercial practice.

The activist and writer Myshele Haywood-Goldberg, in her definition of “Social Conscience” for the University of Strathclyde and the Centre for Human Ecology, describes a framework whereby the triad of consciousness, structure, and agency interrelate to create a strong (or weak) social conscience.

“It will become clear in the course of conversation that each person has a unique ‘constellation’ of social conscience – their own particular blend of consciousness, structure, and agency. Many people are passionate about similar issues, but understanding why they are passionate, how they are passionate, and about what, exactly, will help us work more effectively with them....None of us can transform everything, but each of us can transform something. If we reflect on our values and where we feel called to serve, we can focus our efforts and better understand the efforts of others...”

The speakers will examine, investigate and discuss their own moral motivations and questions that have arisen during their development as Illustration practitioners.

The topics are proposed to cover various responses to ethical and moral questions:

- Satirical responses: political cartoons and popular illustration of 19th, 20th and 21st centuries**
- Raising awareness: Speakers will reflect on the meaning and relevance of having a social conscience in art and design,**
- Personal experience: Reflection on long careers in Illustration and drawing and how issues such as female identity, social pressures or political views have created opportunities, challenges or obstacles within the constraints of commercial and real-life Illustration practice.**
- The notion of ‘praxis’ and what it means when ideals or principles are integrated successfully into practice with intention and purpose.**
- Historical perspective: An overview of the role of satire and how it reflects dissent and opposition to regimes which may be perceived to be unfair or oppressive (conversely, how satire can also repress progressive movements eg. Women’s Suffrage).**

Proposed/invited speakers:

Prof Brian Maidment, Liverpool John Moores University (Accepted)

Brian Maidment is Professor of the History of Print at Liverpool John Moores University. His research interests are focused on the nineteenth century, especially mass circulation, popular and illustrated literature, and he has published widely on a broad range of topics, although more recently he has concentrated his interests on Victorian periodicals and early nineteenth-century visual culture.

Andrzej Krause, Political Cartoonist (Accepted)

Andrzej has contributed to The Times, New York Times, International Herald-Tribune, Sunday Telegraph, Bookseller, Listener, New Scientist, Campaign, Modern Painters and others. In 1985 he was appointed Visiting Lecturer at the Royal College of Art, and in 1997 External Examiner in the Department of Illustration. In 1996 he won the Victoria and Albert Museum Award for Illustration.

Karrie Fransman, Graphic novelist and comics artist. (Accepted)

Karrie Fransman tells visual stories in books, newspapers, animations, sculptures, on Ipads and in virtual reality. Her comics strips and graphic stories have been published in The Guardian, The Times, Time Out, The Telegraph, The New Statesman, The Young Vic, Psychologies Magazine, The Arts Council Create Magazine, The Goethe Institute and for The British Red Cross. She collaborated on animations for BBC Radio and IFRC Red Cross. Her graphic novel, The House That Groaned, was published by Penguin Random House's Square Peg. It received praise from film director Nicolas Roeg and was chosen as Graphic Novel of the Month in The Observer. She developed an award winning comic, 'Over, Under, Sideways, Down' about an Iranian teenage refugee, for The British Red Cross, created an installation for the British Council and Southbank Centre and was commissioned to make a 'Selves Portrait' for an exhibition with Manchester Art Gallery and the National Portrait Gallery. Her new graphic novel 'Death of the Artist' was published by Jonathan Cape in 2015 and was awarded a grant from the Arts Council England.

As a department we have been selected to hold a table by the 'Angoulême Festival de l'Image et la bande-dessinée' (the largest and most highly regarded of its kind in France) for six years running. Currently awaiting acceptance for 2019.

Fumio Obata: Work on the Fukushima disaster and related projects including exhibition of comic art “On the Palm of Unknown”, Beacon Museum in Whitehaven, Cumbria, until 25th March 2018.

Commissioned by Lakes International Comic Arts Festival, the art project makes surprising connections between the nuclear plants at Fukushima and Sellafield.

George Hounsome:

2018 – “Entangling” – an illustrative presentation of *“Human behaviour and its effect on nature ,upsetting the balance and changing the narratives of nature became themes, which I am exploring on a deeper level with Entangling. Here, though, it is ignorance and mass behaviour that has altered our environment. Entangling echoes this idea of changing nature through behaviour, something beautiful into something ugly, destruction through behaviour and habit.”*

Andrew Morrison: Book artist, Editor and producer of print journal ‘Techne’, which is retained by the British Library alongside several other works.

Jen Whiskerd: Editor and producer of multi-disciplinary project “Who We Are”, 1st volume 2017, 2nd volume currently underway (18th Nov.) and as part of related events to this one. This project takes stories from a group of diverse persons who have experienced migration to the UK, whether forced or voluntary, and invites students poets and artists to respond visually and collates the responses in a 3-colour Riso publication.

This event will form part of a series that promotes further investigation and follows on from the Cheltenham Illustration Awards exhibitions, events and symposia which have been running annually since 2007.

Some related outcomes (not requiring funding) also being exhibited and taking place within the Stroud Museum/Illustration Dept partnership are a new edition of “Techne” (retained by the British Library) and a second edition of three colour Riso publication “Who We Are”, which reflect the ongoing research interest of Jen Whiskerd in displaced peoples and migration and our responses to them, which also relates to social conscience.
