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WE MAKE THE LIBRARY BY BEING IN IT

My class of first-year BA (Hons) illustrators, working with our library at the Francis Close Hall campus of the University of Gloucestershire, were tasked with examining the structures around how libraries work and propose a plan to begin a zine collection. We first began this project because we felt the primary role of the art library is to acquire, store and provide access to materials, period, but in our practice several areas of disruption began to emerge:

- ◊ **EMBODIMENT** planning for cosiness in their zine collection proposals
- ◊ **JOY** emotionally move patrons in the library
- ◊ **SURPRISE** making the library alive with unexpected surprises
- ◊ **AUTHORSHIP** sharing a community of local zines over curating collections
- ◊ **SHARING** swapping zines with other university zine libraries

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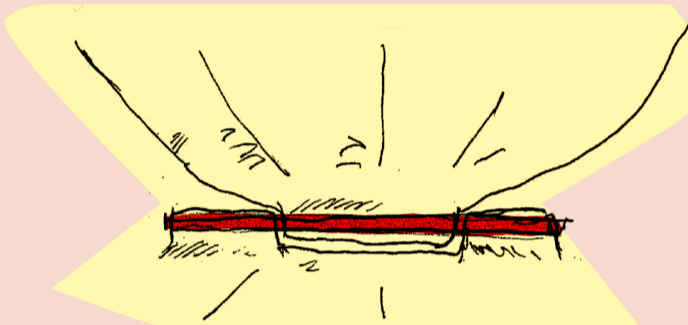
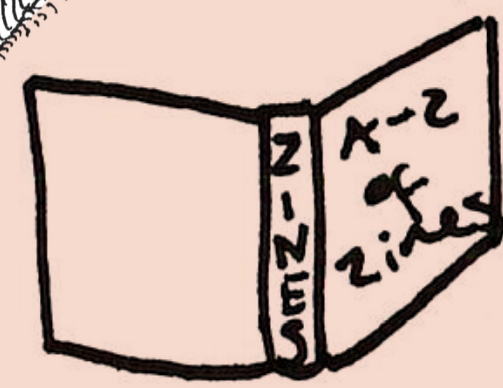
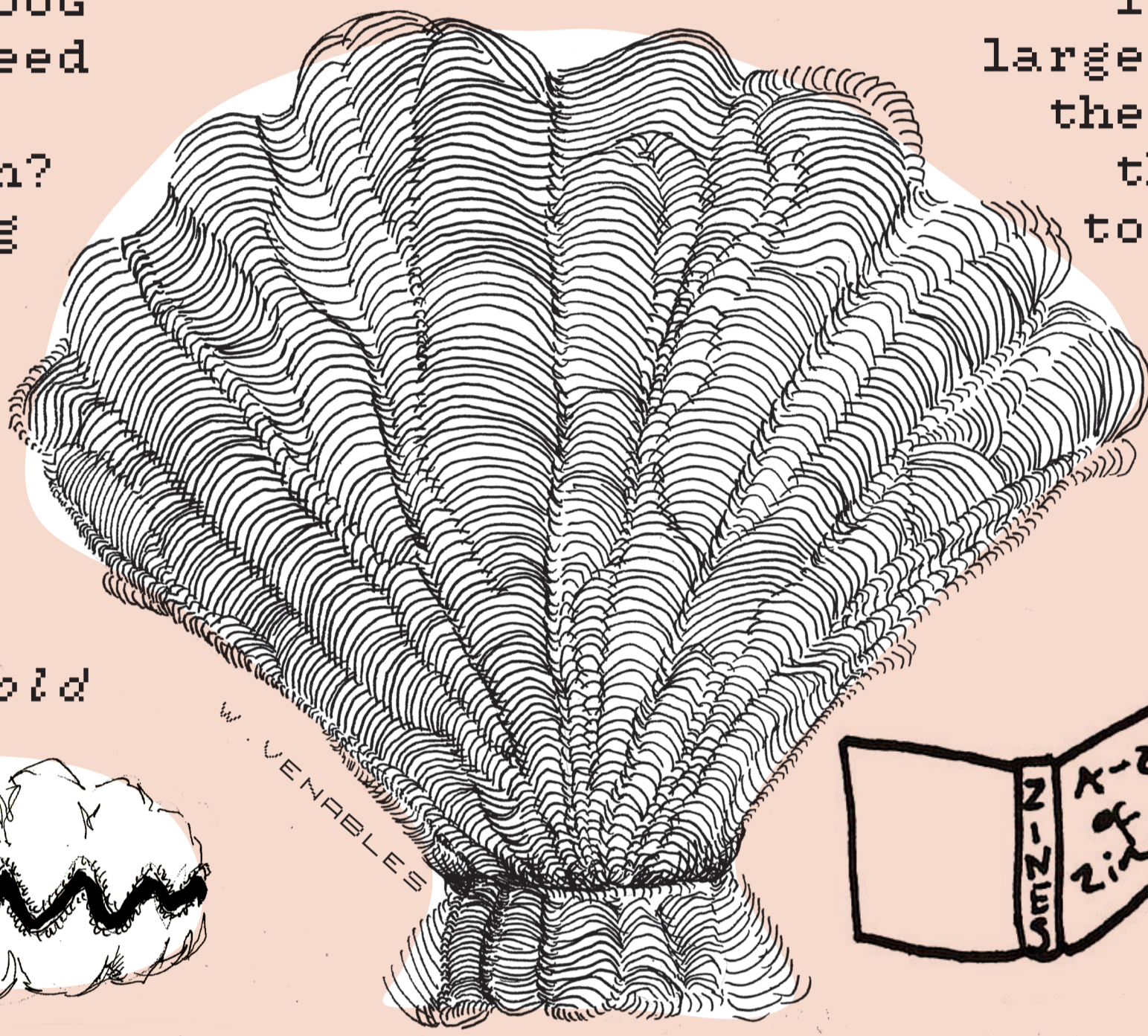
NO RULES

MANAGING THE COLLECTION

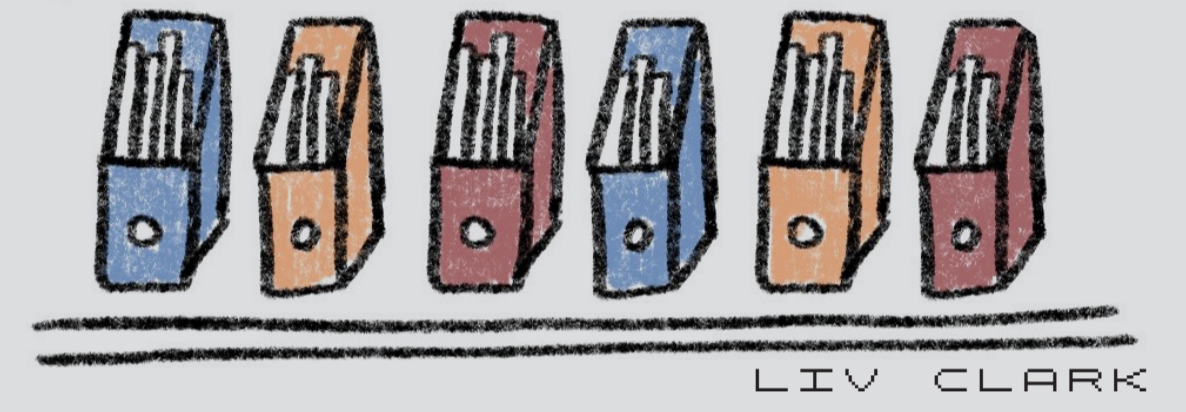
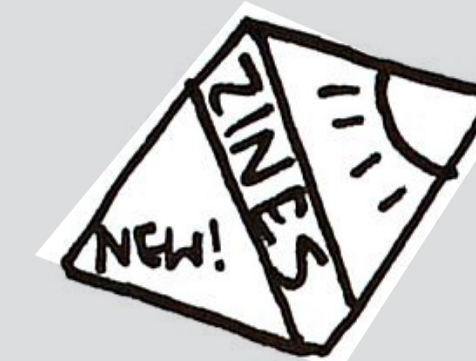

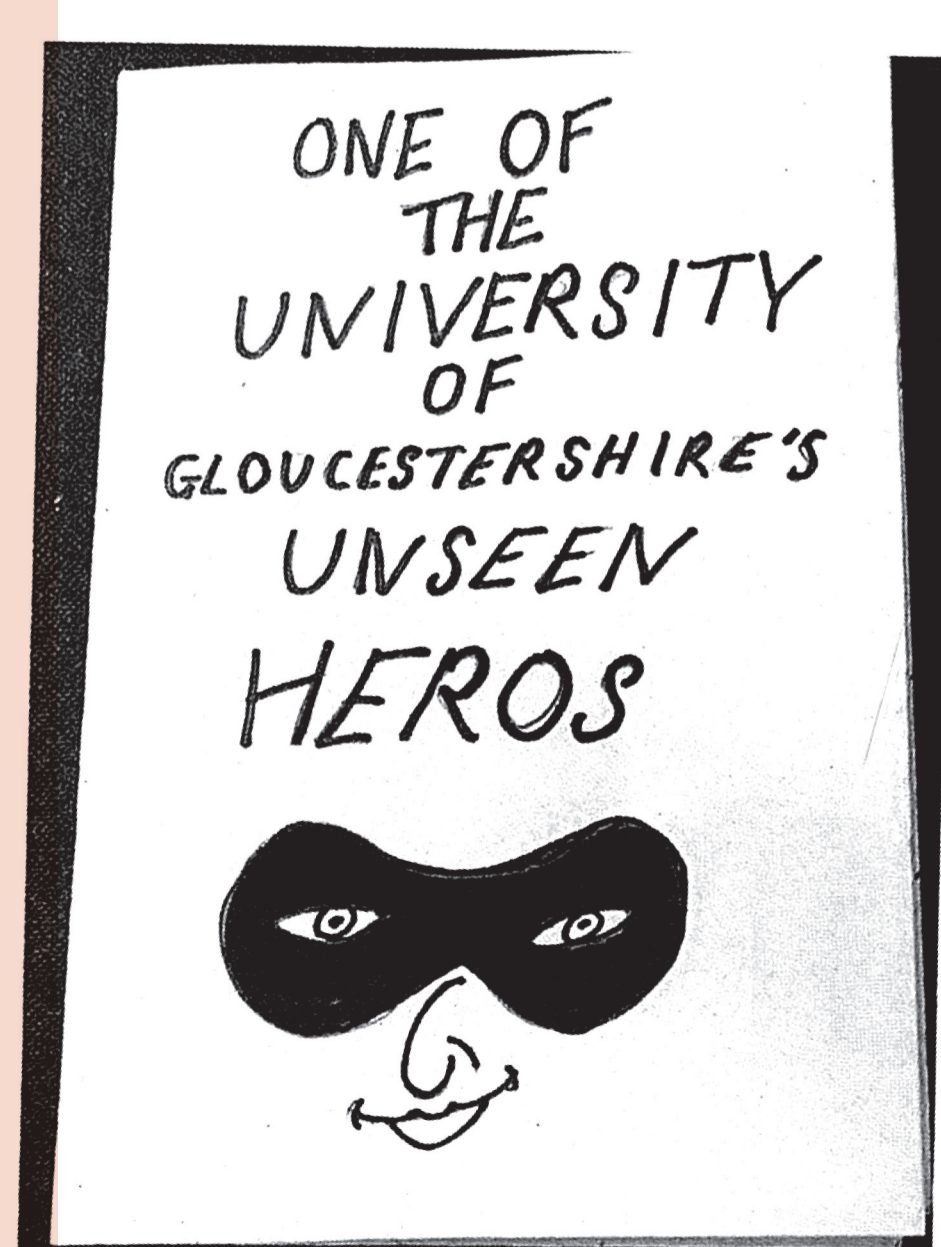
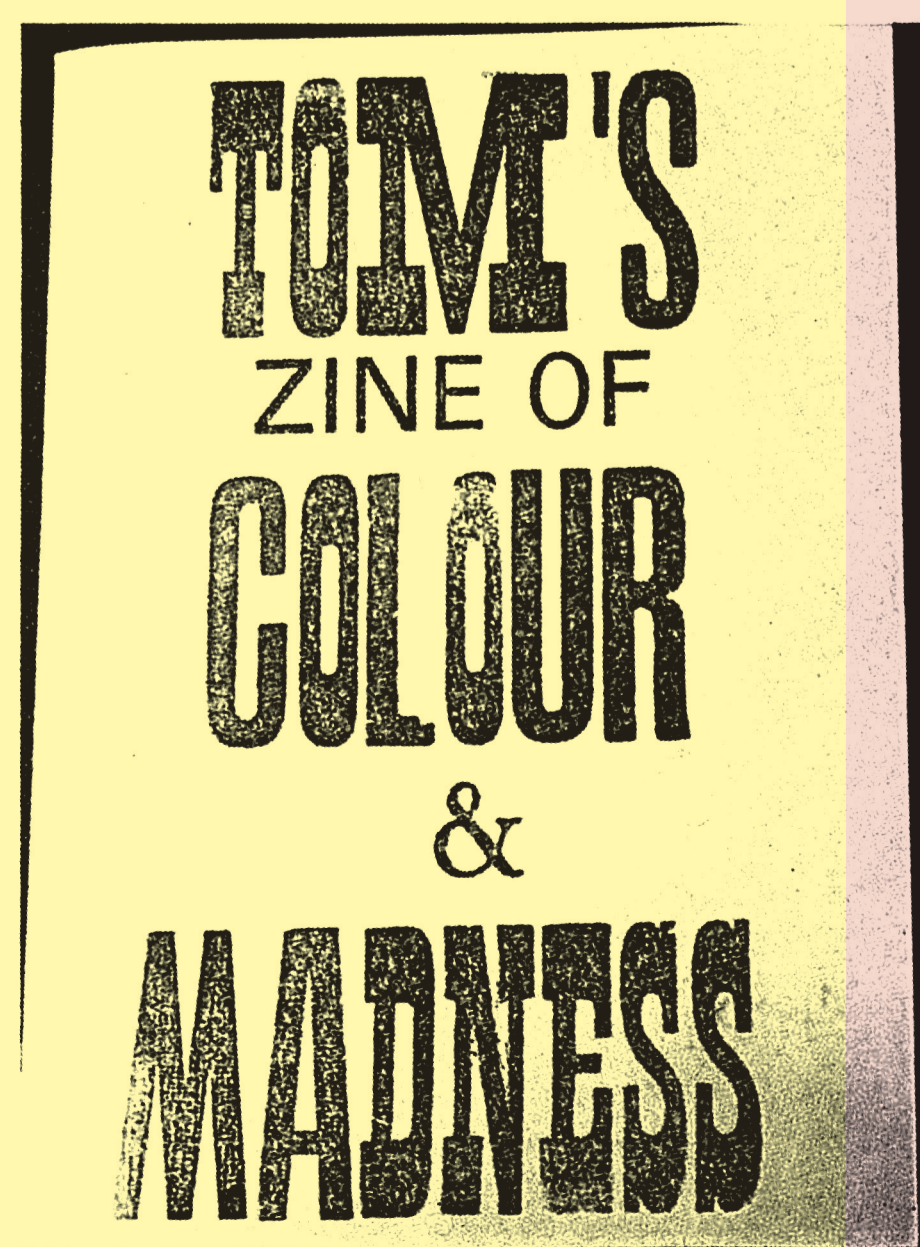


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Other Zine libraries are calling out for content. Why not set up a zine swap? —Tom Arnold
