APPG CONTEXT (1)



- 2012-2018: Ministry of Justice (MoJ) action plans for England & Wales
- Success = 'victims have equal access to RJ at all stages of the CJS
 [criminal justice system], irrespective of their location, the age of the
 offender or offence' (Ministry of Justice, 2017: 2)
- Post-Brexit, UK remains a Member State of the Council of Europe and party to 2018 Recommendation and the 2021 Venice Declaration
- 2013-2016 RJ funding 'ringfenced' to devolved Police and Crime Commissioners
- Post-2016 ringfence removed, 'postcode lottery' of funding and service provision identified





APPG CONTEXT (2)



- Youth Offending Services fund a lot of RJ, embedded in practice.
- RJ happening in schools, mental health settings, housing, social work, community conflict management, and some other organisations and businesses (e.g HR processes)
- Victims Code of Practice (VCOP) of Crime in England and Wales provides a right for all victims and offenders of all ages to receive information about restorative justice (Ministry of Justice, 2021) between 5-7% remember this offer.



PHASE 2: WORKSTREAMS


- i. Raising practitioner standards within the criminal justice sector

- iii. Implementing restorative practices in education, health and social care
- iv. The commissioning, collection, and dissemination of evidence-based research & the benefits of a national reporting framework



PHASE 3: BEYOND WORKSTREAMS

Restorative

- i. Disappointment of Victims & Prisoners Act 2024.
- ii. Parliament prorogued for UK General election, and reformation of the APPG-RJ brings hope going forward
- iii. PhD researchers commissioned to explore key areas identified by the initial inquiry and subsequent workstreams (Fisk, 2023: Fisk, Hobson, Twyman-Ghoshal, 2024 In peer review)
- iv. Academic analysis of enquiry and workstream reports (Marder et al., 2024)



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
